7:00 – CALL TO ORDER

Louisville City Council met in regular session with Mayor-Council Member Fallot presiding.

MAYOR-COUNCIL MEMBER FALLOT MOVED, SECONDED BY COUNCIL MEMBER GUILLEY, and the motion carried to amend the October 26, 2015 Council agenda removing the request for Executive Session to a later date. The vote: All yea.

Council Members bowed their heads for a moment of silent prayer followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

**MINUTES OF THE SEPTEMBER 21, 2015 COUNCIL MEETING**

Mayor-Council Member Fallot declared the minutes of the September 21, 2015 Council meeting approved as presented.

**CITY MANAGER'S REPORT**

City Manager Tom Ault reported on the following items:

- A lot going on in town. Asplundh is trimming trees, paving is complete, the Reno water tower is being prepared for paint.
- Norfolk Southern will close the North Chapel railroad tracks next week for resurfacing. The Broadway tracks are being resurfaced now.
- The Redwood Development is under way.
- Planning Director Vince Marion reported on the three property demolitions. Asbestos removal will be complete this week and demolition will follow immediately.

**FINANCIAL REPORT OF RECEIPTS AND DISBURSEMENTS FOR THE MONTH ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 2015**

Council was presented with a financial statement prepared by the Department of Finance indicating the City’s financial status for the month ending September 30, 2015.

**PERSONS APPEARING BEFORE COUNCIL**

Mike Baumgardner of USW Local 1046 VP addressed the Council with an update on the ATI lock out. Twenty two hundred employees were locked out on August 15<sup>th</sup>. Negotiations were held in May and there has not been much communication since then. The company did accept the union’s offer of a day to day extension on June 29<sup>th</sup>. Issues include health care, pension, work schedules and contracting out work. A Federal Mediator scheduled a two-day session with both sides, but it was apparent on the first day that the company was not willing to budge.

Mr. Baumgardner asked for the City’s support.

MAYOR-COUNCIL MEMBER FALLOT MOVED, SECONDED BY COUNCIL MEMBER GUILLEY, and the motion carried requesting City staff to write letters on behalf of City Council to both sides, urging them to work for a reasonable resolution for all parties. The vote: All yea.

Mike Snyder of 1288 Wynridge Avenue addressed the Council with a proposal regarding the Veterans Memorial restoration. The Memorial is crumbling. Mike

distributed a handout with background information on the project. The Vietnam portion of the Memorial was dedicated in 1985. The names of 46 military personnel who paid the ultimate sacrifice are listed. In addition, there has been at least one area death from the War in Afghanistan.

Because the Veterans Memorial is on City property, he requested permission authorizing a committee to coordinate a restoration project through community fundraising. The Constitution Committee will serve as fiscal agent for this initiative. Donors will be asked to donate at least \$25 to honor a military veteran.

The following community groups will be asked to be partners: American Legion, Blue Star Mothers, Eagles Club, Chamber of Commerce (already committed), Constitution Committee, Kiwanis Club, Louisville Nimishillen Historical Society (already committed), Rotary (already committed), and the VFW.

The timeline is undetermined but the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the attack at Pearl Harbor (December 7, 2016) would be an appropriate occasion for a dedication ceremony.

MAYOR-COUNCIL MEMBER FALLOT MOVED, SECONDED BY COUNCIL MEMBER GUIDONE, and the motion carried authorizing a citizens committee to conduct a restoration project on the Veterans Memorial. The vote: All yea.

### **BOARD OF CONTROL**

COUNCIL MEMBER GUILLEY MOVED, SECONDED BY COUNCIL MEMBER GUIDONE, and the motion carried approving the final change order to Rudzik Excavating in the amount of -\$7,229.13 (deduct) for the State Route 44 Water/Sewer Extension project. The vote: All yea.

COUNCIL MEMBER GUILLEY MOVED, SECONDED BY COUNCIL MEMBER CASAR, and the motion carried for the emergency adoption of Ordinance No. 15-36. The vote: All yea. Mayor-Council Member Fallot declared Ordinance No. 15-36 duly passed and enacted.

COUNCIL MEMBER GUILLEY MOVED, SECONDED BY COUNCIL MEMBER GUIDONE, and the motion carried amending Ordinance No. 15-38 to read:

BEING AN ORDINANCE ADDING CHAPTER 192 – INCOME TAX, OF THE CODIFIED ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF LOUISVILLE TO BE EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 2016

The vote: All yea.

This Ordinance is mandated by the State of Ohio. Council Member Guiley commented that this is an example of the State taking away local government control.
